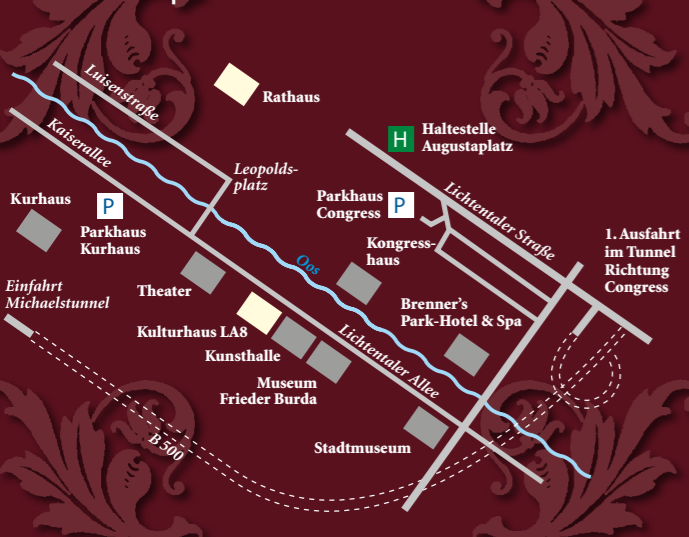

International Congress

Between Healing and
Pleasure – Spa Parks and
Spa Gardens in Europe

Baden-Baden, March 19 to 21, 2015



Introduction

There is no spa resort without spa parks and gardens. The green spaces are inherent parts of spa towns having emerged as distinct types of settlement since 17th century Europe. They mark the structure, the looks and image of spa towns and bathing resorts still today. And they played an important role in the traditional European spa concept that combines mainly water-based therapy with pleasure, social events and exercise.

As varied and numerous as the spa towns in Europe are the spa gardens and spa parks. But do these grounds – equivalent to the spa towns that present a particular form of settlement - also develop their own garden type?

Fountain avenues, music pavilions, carpet beddings and promenades

The aim of the conference “Between Healing and Pleasure – Spa Parks and Spa Gardens in Europe” is to specify the characteristics and the historical significance of European spa gardens and spa parks and to discuss the subject by comparing international examples. Whereas the talks deal with the diversity of European spa grounds in terms of time and region at first, they subsequently discuss the formal and functional particularities and distinctive features by giving an overview and by presenting examples. Beyond that they look at the interrelation between spa grounds, urban planning and cultural landscape. The session closes with questions of maintenance and conservation of historic spa gardens and spa parks.

The conference is associated in substance to the former international conference “European Health Resorts and Fashionable Spas of the 19th Century” which took place in Baden-Baden in 2010. It also makes a contribution to the current process of a serial nomination of several European spa towns to be listed on the World Heritage List.
